One of our favourite activities was to develop Rangoli patterns. We found out that these patterns are bright, colourful and beautiful designs that are associated with Diwali. They are placed to welcome the Hindu Goddess Lakshmi - the goddess of wealth - to your house and are thought to bring good luck. They originated in India but are produced wherever Hindu people are celebrating.

Peregrine and Robin's Diwali Journey Day

Years 5 and 6 worked collaboratively to celebrate Diwali journey day.

We considered the themes

of the Diwali and the link they had to the special story told of Rama and Sita.

We focused our day around several craft tasks which each focused on an element of light or celebration.

Some of us created Diwali cards to spread the message of hope and joy.

We then explored Mehndi patterns. We found out that Mehndi is a form of



body art that involves intricate designs being drawn on a person's skin typically on their hands and feet - using paste made from the henna plant. We instead drew around our own hands and used pens to help form the intricate patterns. We also created light frames. We cut out sections of coloured paper and decorated the spaces with cellophane. We wanted to develop pieces of work

which could hang within windows that would spread beautiful, coloured light around a room.
